Entertainment began to become central to both U.S. culture and Western culture in general. The emphasis on entertainment has led Neil Postman to wonder if we are *Amusing Ourselves to Death*, but there is no doubt that of all the inventions to date, television and movies have created the most changes in culture.

I would still suggest that inventions are the child of culture. Thomas Edison famously said, "Never invent what people don't want," and inventions are not adopted unless they connect with what people believe is important.

One of the gods of this age is the god of convenience, and it has wreaked havoc on our culture. If something is convenient, it is adopted, and things inconvenient—whether it be hard work, unwanted babies, or taking time away from our passion *de jour*—it must be eliminated.

Who are the richest men in the world at the moment? Among them are those who either entertain us, as in Social Media, or make things more convenient for us.

That should tell you a lot about what we value. Actions speak louder than words. The best test of what you believe, is what you do.
